Thirtieth Sunday in Ordinary Time October 25, 2020

Dear Friends in Christ,

Printed below is a statement from the bishop regarding the pope's comments about same-sex civil unions. "In itself, the statement of the Holy Father regarding civil unions drawn from the recently produced documentary is surprising, and for many Catholics seeking to be true to Christ's teaching, troubling. It seems that he was offering a longstanding personal opinion and not invoking his office to issue an teaching. One is led to speculate: perhaps he is simply trying to dissociate the Church's practice of sacramental marriage between a woman and a man from those unions recognized by the state that entail social and economic benefits for individuals in households who would otherwise not be afforded them? Regardless of his intent, surely he and all Christians are called to recognize all individuals, including those who self-identify within the LGBTQIA+ community, as children of God bearing ultimate dignity and full members of the human community meriting respect and protection from ostracism or harm. As with his previous, often-cited "Who am I to judge?" comment, which was lifted out of context and given a very different interpretation than what the Holy Father was addressing at the time, we will all need to examine the larger context of this conversation and look for Pope Francis to provide further clarification before offering further comment."

A couple points of which I thought to summarize the situation (with some inspiration from the bishop): (1) regardless of one's confusion about their sexual orientation, they are still created in the image and likeness of God as much as someone who does not experience such confusion and are to be equally loved and respected and (2) official Christian teaching regarding this issue (i.e. chastity in any and all relationships and marriage) has NOT changed.


All Saints Day and All Souls Day T



Readings and Ouestions for Faith Sharing Thirtieth Sunday in Ordinary Time, October 25

Theme: The Greatest Commandment - "Love".

Reading I: Exodus 22:20-26 • Take care to be just, especially to widows and the poor.

Reading II: 1 Thessalonians 1:5c-10 • Your faith is an example for others.

Gospel: Matthew 22:34-40 • The great commandment.

National Vocation Awareness Week

This is celebrated in our country November 1-7. Please ask Our Lord for more dedicated, holy priests, deacons and consecrated men and women. May they be inspired by Jesus Christ, supported by our faith community, and respond generously to God's gift of a vocation.

Jude, Apostle, First Century

Judas Thaddeus, called Jude to distinguish him from Judas Iscariot, is often regarded as the brother of the Apostle, Saint James the Less.

Other than a mention in the listing of the Apostles in the Gospels, there is only one reference to Jude anywhere in the New Testament. At the Last Supper, Jesus tells the Apostles that he will reveal himself to them. Jude then asked him, "Master, what happened that you will reveal yourself to us and not to the world?" Jesus answered and said to him, "Whoever loves me will keep my word, and my Father will love him, and we will come to him and make our dwelling with him." (Jn 15:23).

There are some rich traditions and some conflicting accounts about Saint Jude which have come down to us over the centuries. One of the stories comes to us from Eusebius, an early Church historian. It concerns a young Middle Eastern prince, Abgar, who had written to Jesus during his ministry. Abgar invited him to come to visit his domain, a small principality in present day Iraq. Declining the invitation, Jesus, promised to send one of his disciples instead. So, after the Ascension, Jude made his way to Abgar's capitol, Edessa, where, he learned that Abgar was dying from an incurable disease.

As was the custom at the time, when Jude arrived in this new, unevangelized territory, he first preached to the Jews of that territory while staying at the house of one of the Jews, Tobias. When Abgar heard about the wonders which Jude was performing, he sent for Tobias and asked about Jude. Believing this to be his messenger from Jesus, he asked that Jude call on him. In speaking with Jude, Abgar became convinced that Jude was sent by Jesus and told him of his own faith in Jesus and his Father. Jude then cured Abgar and went on to convert many in the principality.

Jude later went into Armenia where he preached and then, with Simon the Zealot, into Persia (Iran) where they made many converts. It was here that the two Apostles met their martyrdom by being stoned to death.

Saint Jude is the patron saint of lost causes and hopeless cases. Many minor as well as major miracles have occurred through his intercession. The entertainer, Danny Thomas, was out of work for a long period before praying to Saint Jude. Soon after that prayer, he found work. Several years later, in thanksgiving, he endowed Saint Jude's Children's Hospital where modern miracles take place on a routine basis.

Because of their common martyrdom, Saint Jude and Saint Simon share a feast day on October 28.

Jude's message today: In a vision to Saint Bridget of Sweden, Jesus noted that Jude would "show himself most willing to help." Many people who have called on Saint Jude have found work after extended unemployment. Others with terminal illnesses have recovered after turning to Saint Jude.

When you have reached the end of your rope and all seems lost, say a prayer to Saint Jude. He will help you too.
