I want to extend a huge thank you to our 25 Catechists! They were tremendous with the children and gave so much of their time to plan and teach classes. All of this would not be possible without them.

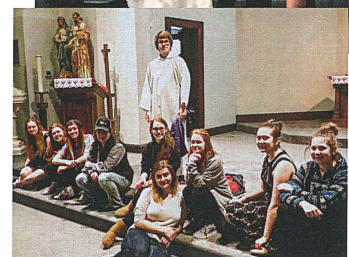
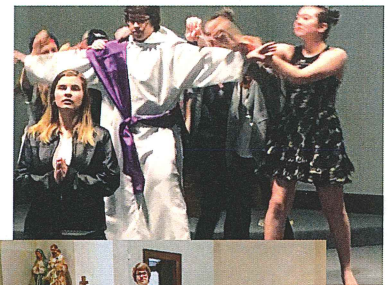

AN EVENING WITH FR. DAN

The McClain family recently sat down for a delicious Mexican meal with Father Dan at El Azteca, one of his favorite restaurants. We had a wonderful Q & A about Father Dan. He commented several times, "I do not like talking about myself." Here is what we learned about our semi-retiring pastor.

Dan Krettek was ordained on July 7, 1978 at his home parish of St. Albert in Council Bluffs. Growing up he described his life as "thoroughly Catholic." His parents were not socialites, so church and family were his social life. He went to the same parish that his parents grew up in and attended the same school as them. He did not have a car in high school, so it was not convenient for him to participate in extracurricular activities or sports.

When he went away to ISU for college, he majored in Forestry. During the middle of his sophomore year, he started hanging around St. Thomas Aquinas Church and Catholic Student Center, and it was there that he became attracted to the influence of the ministry. He still questions if priesthood is his calling, but he knew that he didn't just want a job, but a life to live through his work.

Father's most enjoyable part of his job is the individual spiritual counseling he gets to do. He loves working with people who are recovering from serious "stuff." His least enjoyable part of his job is the administrative responsibilities required. He would rather leave that to someone else.

Father Dan does not reuse his homilies. He tries to connect each reading with a message that will speak to us individually and make us want to investigate further. His first homily spoken was in response to King David as he began his work as King. That message is "Do not make your readiness the criteria for starting something," is a message he still tries to voice today.

In semi-retirement Father Dan will continue his work at Emmaus House, serve on the board of Iowa Bow Hunters Association, volunteer at the



Beginning Experience Weekend, possibly design a retreat for the homeless, gardening, and help kids get their first deer or turkey.

We wish Father Dan all the best and hope that he will stay involved with St. Mary-Holy Cross. I mean, he is seriously going to be right down the street!

RECIPE

HEATHBAR COFFEE CAKE

2 C flour	1 tsp baking soda
1 C brown sugar	1 egg, beaten
½ C white sugar	1 tsp vanilla
1 stick butter	½ tsp salt
1 C buttermilk	4 regular size Heath Bars, chilled



Combine flour, brown sugar, white sugar, and butter and mix thoroughly with pastry blender until butter is in pea-size pieces. Reserve ¼ C of this mixture.

Add baking soda to buttermilk, then add egg, vanilla, and salt and mix well. Stir into flour mixture and mix until all dry ingredients are damp. Pour into greased 9x13 pan (or two 8" pans).

Before unwrapping Heath Bars, crush with mallet. Combine crushed Heath Bars with the ¼ cup reserved flour mixture. Sprinkle on top of batter and bake at 350 degrees for 20-25 minutes.

COMMUNICATION! WHY WE SO DESPARATELY NEED IT

When I attended orientation at Iowa State, they told the entire orientation that effective communication is the #1 skill employers and grad schools want. If that was true, then the degrees like English, Communications, and Public Relations would be highly valued and the jobs for those degrees would pay a living wage. But they don't. Colleges and employers claim they value effective communication, but the fact of the matter is: they don't. We as a society don't value communication. And we have to change that because the future depends on it. Why?

The atomic bombs were dropped on Japan because someone misinterpreted the Japanese word for "no comment"; one wrong verb in a treaty caused a war between Ethiopia and Italy; George Washington pretended to read French and started a war. On a more relatable level: your boss neglects to tell you a deadline until the day of, causing a ton of stress and poor job performance; your significant other doesn't tell you they've taken a job 1,000 miles away until the week before you move; your sister doesn't ask to borrow your favorite sweater and you find it missing. There's a pattern: the inability to effectively communicate often has negative consequences.

Take a second and reflect on your communication efforts. Do you tell your husband/wife why you're upset about something they did or do you just hint at it? Do you always wait for your boss to give you information you know they have or do you ask for it? People tend to think communication is a skill everyone has because everyone can talk, right? Yes, everyone can communicate. But not everyone can communicate *well*. And that right there is the kicker. You don't have to have perfect grammar or a vocabulary the size of a dictionary, but you do have to make a conscious effort and have awareness of whom you're communicating with.



Over the next few weeks, try to become more aware of how you communicate with others. Effective and purposeful communication is essential. It brings all of us closer emotionally, spiritually, and physically. Try to pay attention to how you interact with particular people and how they react to you. Make little adjustments to your interactions with others. For example, instead of responding to your roommate's passive aggressiveness by giving them the cold shoulder, ask them "Is there something I am doing that's upsetting you?" You'll be amazed by what you notice and the results you'll get!

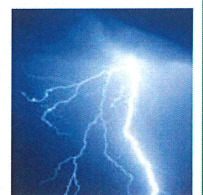
Earlier this year, we distributed funds raised through the CPID drive to Candeo, On With Life, and Miracle League Des Moines.

We have also welcomed five new members to our Council since July 1st: Blake McClain, John Roberts, Andrew Jungers, Scott Fisher, and Rob Roling.

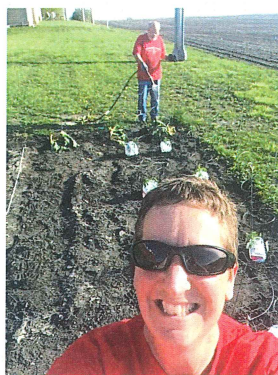
