As adults we look back fondly on birthdays, graduations, weddings, and other events that mark an end to something and a new beginning of something else. As Americans we mark these moments with particular ceremonies indicating that they are important. As we look back on these events; young people look forward to them.

One temptation that we can face as Catholics is viewing our faith in terms of milestone moments. We graduate from baptism to confirmation to marriage and maybe we do not give thought to the journey we are all on as Christians. Jesus wants to walk with us in this journey. Just like with the disciples on the road to Emmaus Jesus journeys with us and continues to teach us and feed us with Word and Sacrament. Sometimes young people as they experience these milestones and get some level of freedom, and they can tend to wander off the road. There are so many options now for young people that it is easy to get lost and to forget that Jesus wants to simply be with them. In my work with young people I find that they often do not outright reject Church teaching, but often they simply fall out of practice of practicing their faith. So, what are some concrete steps or practices to living our faith and staying on the road with Jesus? First, going to mass every Sunday. This is most important. I promise if we put our faith as our number one priority the rest of our life will be better because we keep the most important thing, the most important thing. Keeping the Sabbath day holy is good for us. God does not need our worship, we need it! Secondly, spending some meaningful time in prayer each day. Again, this is for our benefit. How can we say we want a relationship with someone if we do not spend some time each day with them? Finally, go to confession regularly. All of us fall, and all of us struggle with sin in one way or another. Confession keeps us accountable and shows the areas where we can grow as Christians. Oftentimes when we go to confession, we feel like we are at our worst, but really it is when we are at our best.

Milestones are great and important events, but we also remember that our true home is the heavenly kingdom and our journey is hopefully moving us toward that ultimate reality.
